# Weather delays crane installation

Rainfall in 2022 proved record breaking, eclipsing a 70-year old record from 1950, and wet weather continued into 2023, disrupting building progress.

In December 2023, we communicated that a tower crane was scheduled to be installed on 24 January 2023. However, unfavourable conditions meant it was rescheduled to Wednesday, 15 February 2023.

Residents in the immediate proximity have already been notified by Taylor about this change, and an updated notice is also published under 'Community updates' about the project at the College website.

Junior School students discover what happens behind the scenes in the 'Development of spaces'

#### Year 6 (2022) students participated in a 'Development of spaces' unit of study and invited Mrs Laura Elder, Director of Business Services, to explain the processes that are required to develop the new Sport and Wellbeing Centre.

'We were interested in the whole process from design through to development,' explains Kaitlin.

'Right now, this project is in the excavation stage – digging up the ground, which means there are particular considerations that have to be made, like the safety of the neighbour's house and about noise produced by equipment on the site. But I didn't realise how much work, planning and thought goes on behind-the-scenes.' consulted, like neighbours, local councils and government departments,' says Madeline.

Emily agrees, 'The whole planning process and timeline is far longer than I realised. Mrs Elder helped us understand that to build something like the Sport and Wellbeing Centre, there is a lot of planning and communicating before, during and after! Importantly, you need to communicate with neighbours and other relevant organisations to help them understand what you want to do and why Then, you must listen to them and understand how your plans might impact them. This may even change your plans.'

The girls heard how some neighbours opposed the



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Likewise, classmates Emily and Madeline also had not realised how long it took to plan for the development, or how long it will take from initial planning through to completion.

'I was surprised about the length of the planning process and how many groups are involved,' says Madeline. 'Long before any construction work begins, many people must be Centre's original plans because they were concerned about how it might change the streetscape or increase traffic.

The students explored the topic of traffic management and recognised that traffic already peaks around the College at certain times each school day. They noted that 'traffic, and especially trucks, need to be managed well to keep

everyone safe'. They learnt that community communication is required during the development, which means that the project team must provide timely construction updates to neighbours, make relevant information readily available (such as on the College website), address any complaints or questions, and engage in problem solving along the way.

'It's important to put the other person's perspective into consideration when doing something that may impact them,' says Adel. 'They might work from home or have a small child who needs to sleep during the day, so it's important that they know when a disruption may occur and how long it will last.'

The way the project team treats its neighbours is much like how we should treat one another, the students agreed. They identified six important qualities: respect, listening carefully, kindness, consideration for another's viewpoint, service, and being informed to respond intelligently. They also considered the type of information that neighbours would like to hear about, such as how dust and noise are monitored, how the project team is managing any impact on the local community, the operating hours of the site, the attention to safety and traffic management, and that the project is following the approved plans.

'The local community are really important to your project,' Kaitlin concludes. 'Even though they may not necessarily want the change, their input and feedback can really improve your plans to make the process and outcome better for everyone.'
